## Clerical couple comes to Cardston

Robert and Betty Schwab, both ordained ministers in the United Church, arrived in Cardston July 6 and will commence ministerial duties at the Cardston and Magrath United Churches this Sunday.

Mr. and Mrs. Schwab are in their late thirties and have a 10½ month old son named David. Prior to their move here they were students at Emmaneul College in Toronto, Cardston being their first official 'onthe-job' assignment.

"We wanted to come to Alberta. It was a first choice.



Saskatchewan and Manitoba were our second and third choices," said Rev. Robert Schwab. "We are glad to be in Car-

dston. We heard of the good medical facilities here, which was what we wanted for the baby."

There are seventy-five United Church clergy couples in Canada. "Within a few years one third to one half of our people will be clergy couples," Rev. Robert Schwabb said. "Fifty percent of



our women are now training for the ministry."

In reference to the Church's growth Mr. Schwab said, "People have been trying to bury the United Church but it's on the upswing. Our youth organizations, in particular, are vibrant."

The Schwabs replace Rev. Howard Usher who has been transferred to a United Church in Edmonton.

#### Lutheran minister arrives

The Faith Lutheran Church of Cardston and St. John's Lutheran Church of Magrath installed Reverend Daryl Larson as their pastor July 24.

It marks the first time in the history of Cardston that a Lutheran pastor has resided in the area.

During the installation, Reverend Harry Ruf, president of the Alberta-British Columbia District Lutheran Church of Canada, delivered the message and area Lutheran clergy assisted with the liturgy.

Both the pastor and his wife, Donna, hope to develop outreach programs for the Cardston and Magneth communities

Magrath communities.
"There's great potential here," said Larson. "A tremendous need for an outreach program."

He said depending on the needs in the communities, support groups for the recently divorced, bereaved and unemployed would possibly be set up.

In the fall, Larson also plans to implement youth groups, bible study programs and Sunday school.

Larson, who carries on as a seventh generation minister in his family, was raised in Saskatchewan where his father also served as a Lutheran pastor.

After completing his undergraduate studies in Abnormal Pshychology at the University of Alberta, Larson took over as associate director at an assessment centre for juvenile delinquents.

He then enrolled at Waterloo Lutheran Seminary at Waterloo, Ont. and graduated with a Masters Degree in Theological Studies and Pastoral Counselling.

Later, he completed 1,200 hours of clinical training in substance abuse at Hurley Medical Center of Flint, Michigan before being employed as a substance abuse manager and chaplain by the Port Huron Hospital in Port Huron, Mich.

It was during this time Larson developed and implemented a comprehensive family therapy program, a highway safety program, a marital counselling program and counselled psychiatrics and other patients.

He is also actively involved in the Hospice Movement and has provided technical assistance to several Hospice organizations.

In 1986, Larson enrolled at Concordia Lutheran Seminary in Fort Wayne, Indiana and completed the requirements to enter the ministry of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

For the past year he served as a Vicar at the Prince of Peace Lutheran Church in Quincy, Mich.

Larson was ordained this year in June at the Trinity Lutheran Church in Paw Paw, Mich.

Throughout his career, Larson has integrated pastoral care, clinical psychology and counselling.

Donna has 12 years of vocational rehabilitation experience. She developed a career counselling job placement and vocational evaluation system for business, industry, schools and public agencies.

As well, she holds an undergraduate degree in Special Education and a Masters Degree in Vocational Rehabilitation Counselling from the University of Michigan.

Together, they hope to utilize their skills to the benefit of the communities.

#### **New minister at United Church**

Reverend Doug Cowan looks forward to serving the United Church congregations of Cardston and Magrath as their minister. It is Cowan's first assignment since he was ordained only six weeks ago at BC Conference.

Cowan is from Vancouver Island. He studied theology at the Univer-

sity of Saskatoon.

Cowan will have to attend to about 120 families in Cardston and 90 families in Magrath belonging to

the United Church.

"It will be quite a challenge to serve a minority," Cowan says referring to his new assignment. He has not yet met his colleagues from the other churches in Cardston and Magrath.

Asked what his priorities will be working with the United Church in Cardston and Magrath, Cowan mentioned three priorities: strong vorship leadership, visiting peo-

ple, and bible studies.

"I don't intend to hide in my office," Cowan says, "I prefer to be with the people. All members of the church are ministers in a way, because they are serving the congregation. I am on the pulpit, but this is only for the people to see me better."

Cowan admires clergymen like Bishop Dom Helder Camara of Brazil, who are working on the grassroots level and are really concerned of what the people need, but he is sceptical with those representatives of the church hirarchy, who are too much involved with

really democratic, if it treats their


minorities in a democratic way," Cowan says.

## Flashback 447 A look back at Cardston

### **New United Church min**

Meet Reverend Douglas Dunn. Rev. Dunn and his wife Alice (more commonly known as "Teddie"), recently arrived in Cardston from Athabasca where the Reverend had spent the last four years as the United Church Minister for that community. He now comes to this area, replacing Revs. Robert and Betty Lynn Schwab.


In a pleasant interview with Rev. Dunn last week, he told me he didn't think of becoming a minister until he was 42 years of age.

"Prior to my career change, I had spent 14 years with the Department of National Defence in Ottawa as a Weapons Specialist for the Navy, but I became disillusioned as a civil servant," he said. "I felt suppressed whenever I wanted to express my personal views. There seemed to be no freedom of expression when working for the government.'

The Reverend was active in his church at the time, teaching Sunday School and being involved with the church youth, and scouting; he even acted as a lay minister occasionally whenever the regular minister was sick. But something was missing; he wanted more spiritual fulfillment.

He decided to become a United Church Minister. "At first I thought I would be a teacher of theology but back then there was a big demand for ordained ministers so I followed that route.

Rev. Dunn started his theological training in Halifax and in 1969 he was ordained to the Ministry.

During his training, he presided over congregations in Quebec and Ontario, but after his ordination he and his wife moved to Alberta where the Reverend served at Gleichen, the Crows Nest Pass, Athabasca,

Rev. Dunn was born in England in 1921 but he moved to Scotland at an early age where he went through school.

He served in the Royal Navy during the Second World War, and in 1948, he and "Teddie" immigrated to Canada. The Dunn's have five children and eight grandchildren.

"I consider myself a liberal theologian," Rev. Dunn said. "I believe God has given us abilities to make our own decisions. We have a certain amount of freedom to interpret rules for living.

He gave an example of his liberal beliefs,

referring to playing golf on Sunday:
"I don't see anything wrong with spending part of the Sunday in religious worship, then later going on the golf course to relax," he explained.

As the Minister for the United Church members in the Cardston and Magrath area, Rev. Dunn's goal is to act as a leader. "I want to encourage spiritual growth and be an example."

Dunn also wants to be a servant to the community, not just a servant to the Church. 'I want to show Christian fellowship to all people here, not only in my church.
