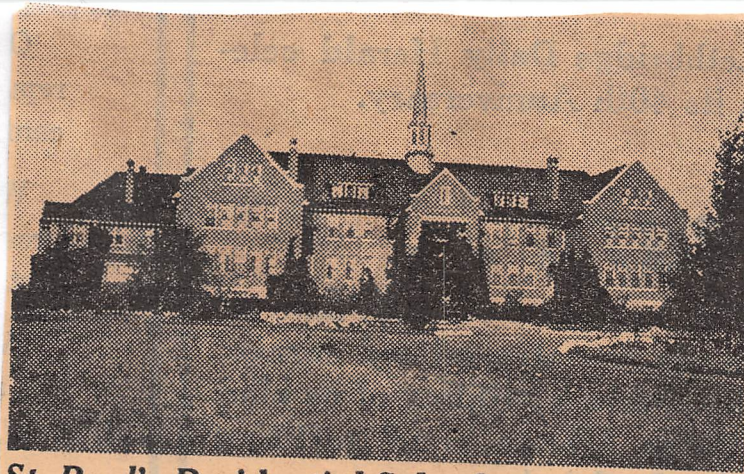


The Original St. Paul's:

100th Anniversary of St. Paul's Church

CARDSTON — In September, 1880, a hardy, rugged pioneer missionary named Rev. Samuel Trivett, arrived at the Belly Buttes. Mr. Trivett established St. Paul's Church and St. Paul's School.

For one hundred years, the Anglican Church has been serving the Blood Reserve, Cardston and District. 1980 is a special year as the Centennial of this great work.

For some years prior to World War I, the 'Southern Alberta Mission' was centered in Cardston. A group of approximately ten clergy and lay ministers resided in the large building which is now the Cardston Masonic Temple. Next door was St. Thomas Church.

These missionaries travelled a large area from Coultts to the mountains and served the spiritual needs of the settlers.

In 1958, St. Paul's Parish and St. Thomas' Parish were integrated. St. Paul's Church was moved from its original site by St. Paul's School (the Church was built in 1929) to its present location. Today St. Paul's Church sits on a high point of ground at the north end of main street in Cardston. It serves a large enthusiastic congregation.

An active 100th Anniversary committee is planning a large celebration at Big Island, north west of the Belly Buttes, June 21st and 22nd, 1980. A circle of teepees will greet visitors and parish-

ioners. Special guests will include members of the Trivett family, the Honorable Frank Lynch Staunton, Lt. Gov. of Alberta and the Right Rev. M.L. Goodman, Anglican Bishop. Residents of Cardston and District will be welcome to attend.

The people of Cardston are quite
disturbed with the announcement that
Canon Mowat, rector of St. Thomas
Church of England, is about to re-
sign his work here and return to
England. Mr. Mowat is one of the
pioneers in Anglican Missions in the
south country and for several years
the Archbishop's Southern Alberta
Mission has been under his charge. It
is reported that he is to leave in
about a week's time.
